COMMUNICATION TECHNOLOGY - LEVEL 3/4 COURSE OUTLINE 2023/24

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General Objectives

Students, having been equipped with the basic technological theory and practice, will apply and enhance their skills. Students will see an increase and broadening of their capacity to communicate ideas and information through technology with en emphasis on the vital importance of idea generation, planning, implementation, refinement, and final post-production analysis. Students will also gain foundational knowledge about Indigenous culture to build upon understanding of, and respect for, Indigenous Peoples in Canada. Possible areas of focus in Communication Technology this year can include:



Career Exploration, Keyboarding Basics, Programming Exploration

Students explore potential career choices in various fields of technology as related to course content, achieve a keyboarding certificate, and explore the world of programming at their own pace of learning.

Course COM 3035 - Raster Graphics 2 (1 Credit)

Students build on the knowledge and skills acquired in Raster Graphics 1 by using raster editing software to create advanced graphics Course COM 3245 - Photography Outdoor (1 Credit)

Students plan and respond to outdoor conditions to capture and produce high-quality outdoor images

Course COM 3105 - AV Preproduction 2 (1 Credit)

Students refine planning skills used in an audio/video/animation project

Course COM 3115 - Production 2 (1 Credit)

Students expand on intermediate audio/video/animation production techniques

Course COM 3125 - AV Postproduction 2 (1 Credit)

Students expand on digital editing software skills to edit and process audio/video/animation project work and continue to apply motion graphics and effects to enhance projects

Course COM 3145 - Animation 3 (1 Credit - by Student Choice)

Students apply production planning techniques to produce a sophisticated animation that tells a story, communicates an idea or message, and creates a mood or establishes a theme.

Course Expectations
